

THE GIFT OF LIFE

In an age in which there seems to be a focus on 'self', encouraging self-esteem, self-expression, self-goals, we are drawn to news items that highlight where reverse actions come to light.

Two such instances impacted me – one in March 2016 and one in April 2017.

You may remember the first occasion - the tragic story of the car at Buncrana pier that began to slip into the water as a family sat watching the sunset.

Inside the car were a four month old baby girl, her grandmother, aunt, father and two brothers (8 and 12 years old). Onlookers watched in horror as the drama unfolded.

The exception was Davitt Walsh who, without thought, threw himself into the water and swam to the car. The only survivor, baby Rioghnach-Ann, was passed to Davitt through the car window.

The second story concerns Matthew Rees who, having almost completed this year's London Marathon, stopped to help a collapsing David Wyeth and carried him over the finish line.

Each runner aims for his/her best time but, as David's legs gave way just 200 metres from the finish, the action of Matthew saw the exhausted David actually gain a higher place than the man whose kindness sacrificed his own finishing time.

Both stories illustrate a genuine spontaneous selfless response to an unforeseen event. I wonder would I have reacted in a like manner? How often in that split second of altruistic thought, cautionary thoughts also come to mind. 'What if I fail in my attempt to assist, and make matters worse?' 'What if this damages my reputation?'

The 'What if...' often stops us from taking action. The above events highlight a genuine core value of the valiant person.

One would hope that the little baby girl, Rioghnach-Ann, will one day grow up to have a true realisation of the actions taken by Davitt to save her.

Likewise that David, the marathon runner, will comprehend the choice made by Matthew on his behalf. It is to be hoped that what was done for both (in different circumstances) will impact their value systems and ways of life forever.

What about the ultimate sacrifice made for each of us? The core of our Christian faith culminated in the terrible suffering and death of Jesus - the Saviour of the world.



At the time it seemed, to outward appearances, to be folly. Yet we realise that the gift of life has been given to us by God (the Creator), out of love, so that we might experience 'fullness of life', as part of the Eternal plan.



We understand that the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus were essential as complete sacrifice to give us Eternal Life. There was no other way!

In making this ultimate sacrifice for Jesus has saved us from us. everlasting death and has given us the opportunity of everlasting life as designed by the Creator.

For as long as we are gifted with the treasure of 'life' in its fullness because οf Jesus, can our daily response be less than complete commitment to Him?



Whilst enjoying and benefiting from all of the blessings bestowed upon us by our Heavenly Father, there will always be an ongoing battle not to conform to those norms of society are at variance to God's that standards and values.

As believers, we are called to live, serve and glorify God rather than ourselves. Our daily walk with the Lord (renewed in prayer; guided by His Word and in service to Him) can fulfil our lives as planned by Him.

125TH ANNIVERSARY

As many of you are aware the story of McQuiston began way back in CELEBRATING 1892. At that time the area of Willowfield was rapidly growing and on the outskirts of Belfast were fields green converted into streets with row upon row of red brick terrace houses.






The original building where our church now stands was known as the "Iron Church" and the opening services were held on 24 April 1892. It was at those services that the Rev. T R Ballantine, then a Licentiate of the Belfast Presbytery, was introduced and entrusted with the task of gathering and forming a congregation.

With God's blessing, men, women and children were drawn to the building and the official first service was held on 23 October 1892. We celebrate that occasion this year on Sunday 22 October, giving glory to God for 125 wonderful years.



As the congregation grew to over 250 families the Iron Church became congested and seating accommodation proved difficult each Sunday, especially at the evening service. Even in those days the challenge of raising sufficient funds to build a new church building was an almost terrifying undertaking. However, the young congregation, filled with faith, vigour and enthusiasm set about the task.

They received a substantial bequest from the estate of the late W J McQuiston and on 27 February 1897 the new church building was opened for public worship.

All these men have provided spiritual guidance and instruction and, with the assistance of the Holy Spirit, brought many to faith.

From 1919 to the present day some 52 Assistant Ministers have received training within the congregation and gone on to minister in numerous congregations throughout Ireland, Scotland, Israel and even in Canada.



To assist the ministerial team, we have been blessed by the appointments of a Church Sister, 2 Deaconesses and a Woman Worker. All have brought pastoral support to many within the congregation.

Our first Kirk Session was ordained by the Presbytery in 1905 and since then, men and women elected by the congregation to serve as Elders, have faithfully undertaken their duties with diligence and dedication.



Over the 125 years the size of the congregation has fluctuated, cumulating in 1976/77 when 1614 families claimed connection with McQuiston. Although the number of families claiming connection today is 270, we are still a sizeable congregation both within the Presbytery and in the Province.

As we celebrate 125 years and look back with gratitude we must also focus on the present and the future. As a congregation God continues to bless our witness in the Willowfield area. We continue to give thanks for the faithful preaching of God's word, the joy in our praise and members coming to faith.





In closing may I encourage you all to attend our special anniversary services on Sunday 22 October at 11am and 7pm. It will be great to see the church building filled for the visit of the Moderator and to offer grateful thanks for God's blessings on our congregation.
