JESUS SAID "... APART FROM ME YOU CAN DO NOTHING."

Around the world in July of this year a significant event was remembered and celebrated. It was the 50th anniversary of the first landing on

the Moon (Apollo 11) and the first time that two astronauts, Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin, stood on the moon!



Many programmes on radio and TV challenged their listeners and viewers to recall where they were this momentous when event occurred. I remember clearly viewing on TV this amazing first walk on the moon, on a beautiful still evening at Blue Water Lake in Canada.

It was a memorable experience to watch, and to hear Neil Armstrong say "That's one small step for man, one giant leap for mankind."



I read some information recently about this event that I had not known. Did you know that, before Buzz Aldrin stepped out on to the moon's surface, he had celebrated communion on board the lunar module?

The very first liquid ever poured on the moon, and the first food eaten there, were communion elements!

The pastor of the church in America attended by Aldrin would say, in speaking about the many meanings of the communion service, that one of the principal symbols is that God reveals Himself in the common elements of everyday life.

Aldrin wanted to give God the honour and to express his belief that what man was doing on the lunar mission transcended electronics, computers and rockets!

Also that communion symbolised the thought that God was revealing Himself in space too, as man reached out into the universe.

Therefore, before exiting the lunar craft, Aldrin opened two little plastic packages of bread and wine and he participated in celebrating the Lord's Supper by taking communion.


Aldrin also read out Jesus' words (John 15 vs 5), "I am the vine, you are the branches. Whoever remains in Me, and I in Him, will bear much fruit, for you can do nothing without Me."

NASA, however, kept quiet about the communion service, as an atheist campaigner had fought a series of unsuccessful court battles against the crew of a previous mission, Apollo 8, who had read out the Genesis creation story during their orbit.

She considered it violated the constitutional division between church and state.

Despite the opposition to Christian witness on these space missions, it is wonderful to know that 100 microfilmed King James versions of the Bible went down to the moon in the lunar module with astronaut Edgar Mitchell on Apollo 14.

There is also a paper Bible still on the moon, left on the dashboard of an



As we enter an unknown new church year will we find it more difficult to express and live out our Christian witness in an increasingly secular society?

The astronauts mentioned above were proud to be called 'followers of Jesus', and they sought to give Him the honour and glory as they carried out their missions.



The challenge to each of us likewise is to humbly and with thankful hearts seek to walk with our Lord each day, giving Him first place in our lives and seeking to do His will.

Jesus has appointed you and me at this time to be His witnesses, living out His love, His justice and His righteousness day by day.

We can only be effective however, as we learn in John 15, by living closely with Jesus – abiding in Him. Jesus has told us, "Remain in Me, as I also remain in you... You cannot bear fruit unless you remain in Me... apart from Me you can do nothing."

We have been provided with the means to help us do this; prayer (talking daily with Heavenly our Father), the Bible (to grow knowledge of God's way through His Word). the church and other believers (to strengthen our faith).



Let us commit/ recommit our lives to our Saviour today!

What do I put in my shoebox?




