Dear friends,

Tempting as it is to ignore the "elephant in the room" and talk about the weather or anything other than Coronavirus or COVID-19; this virus has so



shaped and touched our lives in recent times that we just cannot ignore it.

This has been true of the church as much as any individual.

Like many of you I never imagined, even in my wildest dreams, that the church, not just McQuiston but every church building across the land would be closed for 6 months.



That didn't happen through two world wars or forty years of civil unrest.

Yet naively as human beings we still imagine ourselves to be in control, to be movers and shakers when in reality all we can do at times is respond.

By all accounts this pandemic will be with us for the long term and we will have to make the



best of it. What changes will result in terms of how we live and the nature of the church has yet to be realised.



Truthfully, much has been lost but it has

driven me and you perhaps back to consider what is fundamental to our faith, especially since so much of the community aspect of the church life has been eroded and our collective witness hampered.

God however is not disempowered, if that is a proper word, and Isaiah 59 vs 1 gives us grounds for hope. "Surely the arm of the Lord is not too short to save, nor his ear too dull to hear."

Music to our ears! Truth to encourage!

The very next verse though calls us to examine our ways and makes for our discomfort, "2 But your iniquities have separated you from your God; your sins have hidden his face from you, so that he will not hear."



That can never be a popular message for the church to hear, but is it true and do we as God's people need to repent in some respect?

If you believe in prayer, if the work of the church is important to you please ask not only for an end of the pandemic and the discovery of an effective vaccine, but ask yourself how we God's people may have fallen short? What is it that calls for our repentance?



Having done that then ask God in His sovereign grace to bring us through this as a congregation, as the church perhaps leaner but stronger.



With a greater appreciation of what is crucial to our existence, basic to our commission as witnesses; as salt and light in society and with a greater desire to serve the Lord and make Him known in our generation.

It is however by His grace that He sustains us and since this is the Harvest edition of our Pulse Magazine my mind goes to Genesis 8 vs 22, "'As long as the earth endures, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter,

Thank God for His enduring mercies. May the Lord keep and protect you, in Jesus' perfect name.




