EACH NEW DAY

Autumn has arrived and with it the beginning of a new Church year. Hopefully members will have had a

refreshing break over the summer months wherever that may have been, or whatever you decided to do.



Once again September brings the commencement of activities and organisations within the Church. For those who have been in leadership roles with or responsibilities in McQuiston, the opportunity comes again under God's guidance, as to whether or continue not to with these undertakings, or whether the Lord is leading in other directions.

Indeed, for all followers of Jesus, we are to seek this guidance as to the particular 'calling' God has for us in the days ahead.

1 Peter 4 vs 10 tells us "God has given each of you some special abilities; be sure to use them to help each other, passing on to others God's many kinds of blessings."



As our new minister, Rev Philip Boyd, has responded to the Lord's call on his life to serve and work in McQuiston, it is our duty and privilege to support him as he takes on his new duties and workload.

The prayer support of each member will be much appreciated by Philip and his wife, Naomi. It is necessary that we also remember to pray regularly for all the Church activities and organisations that take place



each week; and for the leaders, and the many children and adults who come into the church day by day.

Another instruction, which we are given for daily living, is in 1 Thessalonians 5 vs 18, "In every situation [no matter the circumstances] be thankful and continually give thanks to God; for this is the will of God for you in Christ Jesus."

It is relatively easy to 'give thanks' when all is going well in our lives; when we are in good health; when

we do not have financial worries, or family difficulties; and our work bring us contentment.



However, it can be difficult (indeed can be very difficult) when we are facing trials. challenges, disappointments, heartache, worry, uncertainty, sadness or even death.



This verse tells us that the 'thanks' we give are for God's strength and enabling 'in' or 'through' all circumstances we face, both good or bad.

One example, given in the Bible, is of Habakkuk, who faced difficulties. Yet, we read that he said: "Though the fig-tree does not bud and there are no grapes on the vines, though the olive crop fails, and the fields produce no food, though there are no sheep in the sheepfold and no cattle in the stalls, yet I will rejoice in the Lord, I will be joyful in God my Saviour."

Habakkuk knew that the Sovereign Lord was his strength, his support and his guide. As he prayed from the bottom of his heart (showing his sincerity), he knew God would carrv him PROVERBS 3.5 through.



We can prove that in our life In doing so, this experiences also. will be a witness to others.

Let us remember that each new day is a rich and precious gift from God, with new grace and



new opportunities. Yet there can be occasions when we wake up in bad form, or with a headache, or tired, with little joy in our hearts.

We have the power within us to set the tone for the day in the family, in the workplace and in our encounters with others.

I try nowadays, on waking, to turn my first thoughts to Almighty God, my Creator, my Saviour, my Lord, remembering Psalm 118:24, "This is the day that the Lord has made, let us be glad and rejoice in it."



Also, Psalm 100, "Enter His gates with thanksgiving, and His courts with praise."

Heart I read recently – "Each morning is a new opportunity to reflect on God's work in your life. Each and every day your slate is wiped clean by Jesus' sacrifice on the cross."

Therefore, we can trust in the words of Lamentations 3 vs 22 - 23: "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; His mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is Your faithfulness."

REV PHILIP BOYD

Ahead of Rev Philip Boyd joining us as our new minister in September, we caught up with him in August to find out a little more about him.

Tells us a bit about your background?

I lived at Wingrove Gardens, Orby Grange and then Knockhill Park, attending Elmgrove Primary and then the Royal Belfast Academical Institution.

I then went to the Belfast Bible College and gained a Bachelor of Theology.

Where is your home congregation?

Bloomfield Presbyterian

Can you share with us some details about your family?

My mum and dad are called Susan and Ernest, and I have 2 older brothers who both have their own families; and last August I got married to Naomi.

You were last in McQuiston in 2012/13 as a Ministry Intern what did you do after leaving us?

I went to Australia for a year and met up with the Rev David Campbell.



On returning to Northern Ireland I worked in the Civil Service for about 6 months, after which I applied to Union College.

I completed my Masters in Theology in addition to other qualifications. I then served as a summer assistant in Dundonald; Trinity, Boardmills and then as a full time assistant in Legacurry, Lisburn for almost 3 years.

How did you become "Assistant to the Moderator" in Portrush last year?

The minister of Portrush, the Right Rev John Kirkpatrick spoke with the Clerk and Deputy Clerk of the General Assembly and it was agreed that the Rev Kirkpatrick would contact me to discuss the possibility of me becoming his assistant during his time as Moderator.

He telephoned me on my mobile whilst I was standing on the Kop at Liverpool watching a match! We spoke for a period, I was then interviewed by the Kirk Session of Portrush and was ordained as an Assistant to the Moderator last April.

What benefits have you gained over these years?

It has provided renewed enthusiasm to do the job after a difficult enough time as assistant due to Covid.

The biggest benefit was the experience of being the onlv After a month working minister. together, John was away the whole time, providing me with invaluable experience of doing everything the minister has to do: planning and leading two services each week, chairing Kirk Session and committee meetings, being responsible for pastoral care, and doing baptisms, weddings, and funerals.

Portrush was also an excellent location for thinking about outreach and evangelism as we tried lots of different ways to reach out to the many people coming past our church building each day.

What encouragements did you receive when thinking about coming to McQuiston?

I was very open-minded about which congregation God would call us to and so met with the elders seeking His leading and asking that He would show me a congregation I could work well with.

When I met with the elders of McQuiston there was a real sense of joy and enthusiasm that I maybe wasn't expecting. This was really evident during our two meetings and then when I came to preach on the Sunday, the warm and enthusiastic fellowship continued into the wider congregation where Naomi and I both felt very at home.

I'm excited to help people meet Jesus and grow in their relationship with Him and the fact that God has called me to do that in an area I know and love is very exciting. I went to Elmgrove Primary School and worked in the Tesco across the road so this part of East Belfast has always been on my heart and I can't wait to see how God will use us together to continue to be a gospel witness in the Castlereagh Road area.

Last August you married Naomi, what can you share with us about your relationship?

We were married last August in Dundonald Presbyterian where her father is the minister. She has a Masters in International Business Law and is currently training to be a solicitor. Naomi felt really at home the Sunday we were with you in McQuiston and is looking forward to settling into congregational life even as things are busy!

Music plays an important role in McQuiston. How can you add to that ministry?

I have heard Mark and his colleagues play in church and have attended some Music @ McQuiston events. Unfortunately, I don't have any musical talents but am passionate about our worship being accessible, relevant, and most-importantly God-glorifying. What matters most about our worship, isn't about particular styles but whether it's rich in biblical truth.

Are you both looking forward to living in the Manse and joining the congregation, what challenges do you foresee?

It will be great to live in the Manse. Every church has its fair share of challenges these days and as society continues to change around us we have to constantly be creative in how we reach out with the truth of the gospel to a community that is no longer coming to us.

The challenges of changing demographics, aging an congregation, and a large building many churches are familiar to around. The fact we have been given seven-year reviewable tenure а because of these challenges can feel daunting but it needn't be.

This is in fact an opportunity to seek God's will for the future of gospel witness in our part of East Belfast and to try and see how we can play our part in sharing the Good News of the gospel with those He placed around us.

What are your hobbies/interests?

We love eating out and going to the cinema. We also love holidays and indeed we visited Australia last February / March.

Have you thought of a theme for your services in 2023/24?

I plan to start with the gospel of Mark and work our way through it. I really just want to start our time in McQuiston my focusing on who Jesus is and all that He has done for us.

Mark is the shortest gospel and he usually gets straight to the point, telling us exactly what we need to know. In the evenings we'll look at a few different topics, but with an emphasis on the Old Testament to complement the mornings.

Have you a favourite verse/passage from the Bible and favourite hymn?

I have a few including Philippians 2 vs 1 – 11, Deuteronomy 30 and the Book of Psalms. Singing Psalm 100 has always been meaningful to me and I really enjoy finding modern settings of the Psalms to sing in congregational worship.

I particularly enjoy songs by CityAlight and Sovereign Grace at the moment.

Rev Philip Boyd will be installed in McQuiston on Friday 15 September at 7:30pm. Please plan to join us for this important occasion. Philip will then commence worship services on Sunday 17 September.

HARVEST REFLECTION

My family recently got our first dog, a little rescue mix of a retriever and poodle and who knows what else! This has been wonderfully exciting!



I have always wanted a dog but my wife felt that five kids were enough to look after. I love dogs and my friends' dogs all love me but now we have one I am still trying to win our Bella's love.

Bella loves my daughter Jessica who sat with her in the car on the way to our house for the first time and pines after her when she is not around.



As soon as Bella sees Jessica, she wags her tail, runs to her and jumps playfully; she doesn't do this with me.

I have shown Bella affection, stroking her for as long as she'll let me, given her treats, water and food, looked after her and spent lots of time with her. I have bought her toys and brought her on walks, but she has still not shown me any love or appreciation in return - not even a wag of the tail.

I call her to come and she stays where she is. I ask her to sit beside me and she walks away.



As I spoke with Jessica about this, she was the one who drew the Gospel parallel. She pointed out that the Lord does so much for people and yet, like Bella with me, so many of them fail to show any kind of love or appreciation in return.

What does He do? He keeps on showing them love, is patient with them and provides for them.



The sun shines on the righteous and the unrighteous. The rain still falls



in our wee country. The harvests are still brought in. His mercies are new every morning. At harvest we have an annual reminder and opportunity to say thank you to the Lord for all His goodness to us.



As the Lord Jesus taught in the Sermon on the Mount, we don't need to worry about what we will eat or drink, or what we wear because our heavenly Father provides for us.

In fact He loved the world so much that He gave His one and only Son



and when we receive Him as our Saviour we gain so much else besides.

 Affection - this is love.
We can explore ways to love Him with all our heart and soul and mind and strength.



4. Subjection - this is obedience. The One who provides for us is also the One who made us and the One who redeems us. He calls us to show our love for Him by obeying His commands.



Perhaps if I keep loving and providing for Bella, she will learn to love me. Clearly she has been hurt in the past and finds it hard to trust.

You and I have no good reason to fail to trust our heavenly Father. *"The* Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us. We have seen His glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth."

OBITUARY

Mrs Patricia Wray

The following tribute was read by Ken Galbraith, Clerk of Session, at the meeting of the Kirk Session on 13 June 2023.

It is with great sadness that I advise the Kirk Session of the death of one of our Elders, Mrs Patricia Anne Wray, who passed away at home surrounded by her family on Friday 12 May 2023.

Patricia lived most of her life in East Belfast with a short time in Jordanstown. She attended Harding Memorial Primary and then Orangefield Girls High and on leaving school enrolled at college to study hairdressing.

Patricia and Kenny married in 1975, they lived in Castlemore Park where they have remained for 47 years. They joined McQuiston Memorial when the children were young and Peter was baptised here.

Patricia worked part-time in retail and then moved to work as a classroom assistant. She undertook her NVQ level 3 qualification and worked for over 20 years in Harding Memorial Primary until her retirement in 2021.

She was elected to Church committee in 1989 and as an Elder in October 1996.

Patricia's deep love for children was carried out not just with her own children and grandchildren but through her work as the Youth Club leader here in McQuiston. At that time in the 1990's there were many challenging issues with the children who attended and trying to control their behaviour was often difficult. This was no deterrent for Patricia as she wanted to show God's love to them as so many came from difficult family situations.

Patricia was very tolerant and patient with these kids and always went the extra mile to ensure their needs were met.

Her belief in the importance to nurture children continued when she became our Church's representative elder on Elmgrove Primary School Board of Governors, including the position of Deputy Chair. She had looked forward to seeing the completion of the new Elmgrove school on the former Avoniel site.

Patricia was also a member of McQuiston's Sunday School Management team and an active member of the Friendship Circle and Sole Sisters walking group. She was faithful in her church district visitation particularly when members were unwell.

Patricia enjoyed being involved in her families' hobbies and interests- Gary and his football, Melanie and her volunteering with Childline and Peter and his drama.

When the children married, she looked forward to the arrival of grandchildren and they became a central part of her life.
