
The writer of the popular Christmas carol "It came upon a midnight clear", though writing in the 19th century, has captured something of the same sentiment in his words.

FINANCE UPDATE

Can you believe it has been 10 years since we opened our new suite of halls? As they're now a decade old perhaps they are not new anymore!





Back then we borrowed £500,000 to help finance the building project and as you read this some 10 years on I can confirm that we've done it -we've repaid our loan! Many doubted we would do it (myself included at times), but God has proved His faithfulness towards us.

To celebrate this milestone we will be holding a weekend of celebratory events in the New Year so keep an eye on the weekly Bulletin for further details.



Whilst we've repaid our loan I wish I could say we could take a break from supporting the Building Fund, but as mentioned above the halls are now 10 years old and require ongoing maintenance.



In addition the main sanctuary hasn't enjoyed the love and attention it has required while we have been repaying our loan. Furthermore, it is now a listed building, and will require some significant investment over the next few years.

We are loved and accepted in Jesus - not by any good works we do, not by any effort on our part, not because of our social standing and not because of our financial situation.


loved vou.'

World Development Appeal 2015



The World Development Appeal has been in existence since July 1980, and gives our church members the opportunity to respond to the needs of the poorest and most marginalised of the world's people. We work in long term partnership with the poor, changing lives and communities for the better.

- World Development not only aims to raise money but also to raise awareness.
- World Development supports the continuing campaign to cancel the debt of poor countries.
- World Development supports the Trade and Justice Movement which is working for fairer world trade rules.



The theme of this year's Appeal is *Forecast:hope*! The Appeal highlights the serious effects of climate change which are already being felt in some of the world's poorest countries, demonstrates some of the initiatives which are helping people to adapt, and calls on all of us to work for climate justice, that is, a shouldering of responsibility by those whose lifestyles have contributed most to climate change.

The projects being highlighted this year are in Bangladesh and Ethiopia.

Bangladesh, with its tropical climate and low-lying coastal zone, is a country in which climate change is already having a severe impact. Our partner in Bangladesh is the Bangladesh Nazarene Mission (BNM), which is working through its network of over 55 churches in some of the areas most at risk.





The 2015 Appeal will also support the Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus – Development and Social Service Commission (EECMY), which is developing a new agricultural base for the women of Chewaka district.

Envelopes will be distributed to the congregation Sunday, 13 December and can be returned on Sunday 20 or 27 December. Your giving will enable us to support some of the world's poorest people in building a way out of poverty and into a life of dignity and greater freedom.

OBITUARY

William John Gordon MBE

The following tribute was read by Mr J C Shivers, Clerk of Session at the meeting of the Kirk Session on 24 November 2015.

It is with great sadness that I advise the Kirk Session of the death of one of our Elders, Mr William John Gordon MBE who passed away peacefully on 9 November. He was 93 years old.

John was born in January 1922 and was the only boy in a family with 6 sisters. The family attended Dundrod Presbyterian church. John attended Straidhavern Primary School in Crumlin before leaving to work on the family farm at aged 14. He later attended evening classes at Antrim Tech and Greenmount Agricultural College for a brief period.

For some years he was a member of the fire service at Nutts Corner Airport and was awarded a Queen's Commendation for Bravery for his actions following a serious aircraft crash in 1953. He was also employed as a Field Officer in the Milk Division of the Ministry of Agriculture. Over the years he moved between departments and in 1967 was appointed to set up the Safety Division.

Following that, Health and Safety was to play a major role in John's working life and he was appointed Chief Health and Safety Officer at Enterprise Ulster in 1980. During those years John devoted himself to the safety of others until he eventually retired from work in 1987.

John met Nana and they were married in Lyle Hill Presbyterian in April 1943. Their marriage was blest with the birth of 4 children Mary, Joan, Andrew and Anne. Joan sadly died in infancy and Mary passed away just a few years ago. As a family the Gordons attended a number of congregations of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland, including the Scots Church, Enniskillen, 2nd Castlederg where John was Church Treasurer and Trinity, Omagh where John served as BB Captain and was a member of the Congregational Committee.

The family moved to Belfast in 1967 and eventually joined us here in McQuiston. They quickly settled into the church and started to become more involved within the congregation. John was elected to the Congregational Committee in 1975 and was ordained to the Eldership on 16 April 1978. He fulfilled his duties as an Elder with enthusiasm and faithfulness. As an Elder he visited the families in his District over many years and was always most welcome in their homes.

John also served as Chairman of the Congregational Committee for some 12 years, was heavily involved on the General Purposes committee, acted as Prayer secretary and was a leading figure within Fund Raising Committee. In later years John represented the congregation as a Representative Elder at the General Assembly and would have always presented a very thorough report to the Kirk Session there-after.

John had many interests outside of the congregation including playing golf at Knock with a handicap of 12, advocating for people with learning disability whilst serving on the Orchardville Management Board, he was a founder member and later Chairman of the Edgecumbe Parents and Friends Group, and of course the Limousin Society of which he was President. He was also awarded an MBE in 1995 for services to Health and Safety.

Sadly Nana passed away in September 1997 and John continued to care for Anne at the family home until recently. Over the past few years John's health deteriorated yet he was always keen to attend our worship services and meetings of Kirk Session.

We convey our sympathy to son Andrew, his wife Evelyn and their family, to Mary's family in England, and to Anne; also to his companion Joan thanking God for the life of John who knew the joy of the Saviour's love and who served his Lord with faithfulness.

Having completed his course John has entered into the joy of the Lord and we as a Kirk Session recognise the passing of one of His saints. As is our custom I would ask you to rise for a moment's silent tribute to a beloved Elder.


