# HAPPY BIRTHDAY! HAPPY CHRISTMAS

In answer to the rapping on my front door, I found a little boy (who lived not too far from me) on the doorstep. He had not previously ventured to my home unless with his mother, so this was a first for him!

As he was so young and small he was unable to reach the doorbell. However, the little hand marks on the glass of the door showed his determination to gain my attention.



In my mind, as we entered into conversation, I had a fair idea of why he had come, but I said nothing.

Inwardly I had to smile as, in due course (despite his young age), my visitor skilfully developed the conversation to the point where he informed me, with delight and emphasis, "it is just six sleeps until my birthday!" His little eyes gleamed with excitement and anticipation.



Although I had a query as to the accuracy of the number of sleeps, that fact was not of key importance so long as I received clearly the news that his birthday was imminent!

As he left me to return home — mission accomplished — I could see he was a happy little boy (probably anticipating a little gift in return for giving me the information!).

In a few weeks' time a significant number of this world's population will mark another birthday. As disciples of Jesus we will have the privilege to remember and celebrate

the day of His birth.

However, this Christmas will we have that sense of anticipation and excitement (like my little friend who visited) as we carefully consider once again the meaning of Christ's coming into the world? Or will Christmas be, as for so many, a burden, a worry or an additional stress?

Can we make it (as with the little boy) our main focus to simply celebrate this very important event?

Jesus, the reason for the celebration, will respond wholeheartedly if our focus is on Him.

In Revelation 3 vs 20 He says "Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me!".

As Jesus also simply put it in John 10 vs 10 "I have come that they [i.e. you and me] may have life, and have it to the full". This is the best gift to receive at Christmas time.



The little boy I mentioned is no longer a little boy, he is now a teenager. I may see him nowadays only from time to time, but even if he sees me in the distance I always receive that cheerful smile and wave.

He knows now that it is not necessary to remind me annually of his birthday, as I will always remember and mark the occasion.

In a similar way, as our relationship with the Lord develops – as we grow and mature in our faith – we have the assurance that Jesus will always be there for us ("I am with you always", Matt. 28 vs 20). This knowledge should give us great confidence, comfort and joy.

Over the last number of years my visitor wanted to share the gift of the good news of his birthday with me. It was so important to him that he was determined not to keep the celebration to himself.

Likewise – can we keep the wonderful Good News of what Jesus means to us to ourselves?

This Good News about the life He came to share with us while on earth, the tremendous sacrifice of His life on the cross to give us complete forgiveness and the 'fullness of life' that He promised.



We bring joy to our Lord as we share this wonderful message with others by word and action.



What a wonderful Saviour we have! With this in mind we can know, experience and share a Happy Birthday and a Happy Christmas.

May this be the gift we again receive this year from our Lord and in turn share with others.



# **World Development Appeal**

The World Development Appeal (WDA) is launched in the autumn each year. Over the Advent and Christmas season, PCI aim to raise £500,000 or more for development projects overseas, with funding channeled through our aid agency partners, Christian Aid and Tearfund.



The theme of this year's Appeal is, "A beautiful Idea: Women's voices in fragile states."



The Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) is one of the world's most fragile states. Since 1999, six million people have died as a direct or indirect result of the ongoing civil conflict.



The extreme insecurity experienced by families communities on a continuing basis leads to displacement, Following Jesus where hunger and the breakdown of basic health services.

The reality of good sustainable development work is that it is hard, it is long-term and the forces ranged against you can seem overwhelming. Over the next four years you are invited, through the World Development Appeal, to travel this hard road in solidarity with our partners in fragile states like the DRC.

# **Democratic Republic of Congo**

The 2017 World Development Appeal highlights the work of Tearfund partner, Action Entraide, in the DRC, one of the most difficult places in the world to be poor.



Action Entraide is committed to breaking the cycle of violence, despair and fear. Committed to reducing poverty in the DRC, Action Entraide work in a number of focused areas, which include enabling community awareness of issues related to gender and child protection; savings and small business schemes; and peace and reconciliation, encouraging the participation of Christian young people in development and in the reconciliation process.

Action Entraide also work to enable some of the women who have been deeply scarred by violence to speak out, and to participate fully in the building of a new and more safe and stable society.



#### **Zimbabwe**



The second project being supported by the 2017 Appeal is Padare Enkundleni, a faith based men's forum for gender issues in Zimbabwe, and a Christian Aid partner. The particular project we are supporting will increase the capacity of faith leaders to address issues of gender inequality, gender-based violence (GBV) through church policies and programmes. One of its aims is also to engage men in working to end the practice of GBV in their own communities.

Giving to the 2017 WDA will enable organisations like Action Entraide and Padare Enkundleni, to support some of the world's poorest people, building a future for them in some of the hardest places in the world to be a woman, and to be poor. #### **OBITUARY**

#### **Brian McCartney**

The following tribute was read by Mr J C Shivers, Clerk of Session at the meeting of the Kirk Session on 24 October 2017

It is with great sadness that I advise the Kirk Session of the death of our Senior Elder, Mr Brian McCartney, who passed away peacefully on 11 October. He was 91 years old.

Brian, was born on 2 October 1926, into a loving family who lived in Greenore Street. He had two sisters Helen, who passed away some years ago, and Iris.

Having been baptised in McQuiston he was to spend the rest of his life as an active and respected member of this congregation.

Brian attended Mountpottinger Public Elementary school before moving to Garvey College, Belfast where he studied general commercial activities. His first job was with the County Down Railway before moving to Midland Employers Insurance in 1943.

Brian was to spend the remainder of his working life in the insurance industry, working in the Insurance Company of Ireland and later Bartholomew and James from where he retired as a Director in 1991.

During this time, he was elected President of the Belfast Insurance Institute, Associate of the Corporation of Insurance Brokers and appointed a Fellow of the Chartered Insurance Institute.

On a practical level he offered advice on insurance to many members of the congregation and organised an insurance scheme for the whole Presbyterian Church in Ireland and attended many Presbyteries and Congregational Committees responding to queries raised at a local level.

Brian met a young Elizabeth (Betty) Snowden, who was also a member of McQuiston, and they were married in September 1953. Their family home was on Barnetts Road and they were blessed with the birth of Karen and twins Peter and David. Brian's quiet Christian witness was evident to all and he was a much loved and respected father.

Within our congregation Brian was heavily involved. He served for 27 years as a leader and later leader in charge of the Life Boys (now Junior Section BB).

He was also an officer in the Company section of our BB. Brian also taught in the Sunday School and over the years took on responsibilities as its Treasurer, Secretary and Superintendent.

In the 1970s Brian was instrumental in starting a Sunday School before morning worship through which many young people came to faith. It was also during the 1970s and 1980s that Brian was instrumental in starting and supporting the Ixeus group for young people within the congregation and beyond.

The congregation recognised Brian's many gifts and talents and elected him to church committee in 1949, serving for many years on the Finance Committee.

On 2 March 1952 Brian was ordained an Elder and he continued his quiet Christian witness amongst families in his District and the wider congregation. He was often referred to as a true, humble gentleman.

As an Elder he also served as Convenor of the Personnel Committee and as a Representative Governor at Avoniel Primary school and for a short period at Orangefield High school. When the Peace and Peace-making Committee was established Brian was a founder and enthusiastic member at a time in the 1980s when there was much opposition to the concept.

As our Senior Elder Brian laid the foundation stone of our new suite of halls in January 2005.

Brian had a great love of football and played for BB and McQuiston teams scoring over 100 goals in the Churches League. When he retired from playing he continued to serve as the Secretary of the Churches League team. He was also an avid supporter of the NI football team and would regularly have attended international matches at Windsor Park.

In more recent years Brian suffered from a hearing loss which caused him a degree of discomfort and distress. However, he never complained and battled on.

In January 2016 Elizabeth sadly died and Brian become more dependent on his children. Without hesitation all stepped up providing meals, transport, love and care. In more recent times, due to failing health, Brian moved to Adelaide House Residential Home where he continued to receive Christian love and care.

We convey our sympathy to his sister Iris, children Karen, Peter and David and their extended families thanking God for the life of Brian who knew the joy of the Saviour's love and who served his Lord with undoubted faithfulness.

As is our custom I would ask you to rise for a moment's silent tribute to a beloved Elder who has completed his course and has entered into the joy of the Lord.
