The focus of Christmas tends very much to be on children and young folk. The feelings of eagerness and expectation may diminish to some




extent as one grows older, especially for parents with the additional workload and demands that are a part of Christmas.

World Development Appeal

The annual World Development Appeal of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland is really rather remarkable. Year by year, it offers those from Presbyterian congregations across the island of Ireland the opportunity to learn more about and to support the valuable and vital work of sustainable development currently undertaken by our development partners, Tearfund and Christian Aid.



Each year the Appeal highlights a particular project which becomes the 'lead' or 'focus' project for that twelve-month period and ownership of this lead project cycles between our development partners Christian Aid and Tearfund.

This focus on a particular project gives congregations the opportunity to 'go deep' in understanding some of the challenges of sustainable development in a particular location and to see how the partner agency, working with communities there, is seeking to address them.



The 2019 World Development Appeal highlights partner communities in Inhassoro, Mozambique, with a secondary focus on Bangladesh. The emphasis is on the long-term challenges and the capacity-building required for good and sustainable development in fragile places.

Your giving will enable organisations to support some of the world's poorest people, seeding the hope of a more secure future.

Mozambique is still one of the poorest countries in the world despite the best efforts of government and development agencies to reduce poverty. Mozambique is very vulnerable to natural disasters due to its geographic location. Inhassoro district lies within the cyclone region.



Even if the cyclones do not come, communities in the area are vulnerable to strong winds and either heavy rains, which can cause flooding, or low rainfall which contributes to drought-like conditions.

As such, food security is a major issue for this fragile state. The World Development Appeal 2019 aims to support and strengthen such communities as they discover the resources and potential within them, and to empower them to sow seeds of hope, both in their fields and for their future.


