# "Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers or sisters of Mine, you did for Me"

Recently I listened to a true story by a priest which impacted me and taught me a valuable lesson.



The title was 'Who was the Hungry Person?', and it was a Gospel reflection on Matthew 25 vs 31 - 46.

One day the priest was in his study preparing a sermon when the doorbell rang. He said that, at the time, he was very busy and felt a little impatient at the interruption.

At the door was a fine looking man, who was thin and had a beard. He gave his name as Jim\*, and asked politely for two sandwiches.

As the priest went to the kitchen, he asked himself what he would put in the sandwiches – either cheese or ham, or both cheese and ham. He thought, 'Will I be generous or economical?'

At that moment, he heard a voice (in his head) clearly saying 'Prepare a sandwich as if it were for Me' and, in that moment, he realised who was speaking to him - Jesus.

That changed everything! The cheese and ham sandwich was given to the stranger at the door, who politely said 'thank you' and left.

During the year Jim came back regularly and the priest no longer felt impatient as he prepared the sandwiches. He realised that the stranger was doing him a favour - that he would give Jesus two sandwiches willingly any day.

After about a year Jim no longer visited and, on enquiry, it was to learn that Jim had died. This visitor and the lesson learned were never forgotten by the priest and he was forever thankful for the lesson Jesus had taught him through the stranger.

All of us have areas in our lives that are not surrendered to Jesus. It is sometimes difficult to obey the teaching of our Lord, as we may feel we are in the right, or we don't want to be 'used' or 'abused', or taken for granted.

As in this story we may, at times, be required to yield our wills to Jesus – as day by day we see Him in each person we encounter.

In so doing our words and actions will change if we remember that we are dealing with our Saviour.

This Christmas, as we worship the King, remember that He is the King of our lives. He still is not ashamed to knock on the door of our hearts to call us to live our lives for Him.

He always gives us this beautiful invitation (often challenging) to serve Him here on earth.



Our choice is, in the words of our Saviour, "I was hungry and you gave me to eat" or "I was hungry and you did not give me to eat".

This Christmas we will all have opportunities to show kindness, to share a word of love, to show patience, maybe an hour of our time or to give a helping hand.



The message is to recognise Jesus "In as much as you did it onto one of the least of my brothers or sisters, you did it onto Me".

May we each experience the joy of our Lord this Christmas.


