Dear friends,


Christmas has come upon us very quickly. When I was installed in McQuiston on the 15 September,

AT THE APPOINTED TIME... GOD

As this 'special time' Christmas comes round for us once again, the season in which we remember and celebrate the birth of a tiny baby, Jesus. It is important to note that the birth of Jesus was at the appointed timing of

Galatians 4 vs 14 tells us, "But when the fullness of time came, God.... sent forth His Son". This was not a chance timing, but in the plan and will of Father God for a specific purpose.

In retrospect of course, we know and recognise the plan for Jesus' life but at that time, the reason and purpose were unknown, except to a few people.



I sometimes think that for Mary, receiving the news from an angel of her part in the plan, must have been

such a shock to know that she was carrying a special child, and how challenging to have to tell her parents.

The Gospel account also tells that 'Mary got ready and hurried to a town in the hill country, to the home of a cousin, Elizabeth, for three months'.


This the beginning of Mary's 'time of waiting' and preparation, as God's predetermined plan for Jesus began to unfold.



Although being with her cousin will have been a comfort and support, Mary must have had many times, by herself, of doubting or querying what was happening in her life.

At times for ourselves, things happen that can be totally unexpected, and they can change our lifestyle, or affect our plans and the plans of others as well.

It is a human characteristic, for Christians as well as non-believers, to, at times, ask the question 'Why?' On such occasions it is vital to lean on God, and to pray for necessary strength to trust that, in His timing, we will understand what is happening.



The Gospel of John 1 vs 3 reminds us that, "Through Him (God) all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made".

So, as the beginning of time and creation, set out in the book of Genesis, was a link in the chain of God's purposes for creation and mankind, so the birth of Jesus was an essential part of the plan of 'salvation' for God's creation and the generations of people to follow.



Likewise, you and I fit in in God's wonderful planning, but very often unknown to us, prior to events happening.

Psalm 139 vs 13 - 16, reminds us "For You created my inmost being; You knit me together in my mother's womb; Your works are wonderful," and "Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in Your book before one of them came to be."

Jesus told His followers that He had come so that they might have life and have it in abundance.



In Jesus' time, as in our world today, many people were not interested in, or wanted, what their Creator had planned for them.

It is awesome however to realise all this, and to know that God has had a plan for your life and for mine before birth. If we




accept this reality and desire to have God's planning as the way to live, it gives each of our lives purpose, focus and meaning.

Its climate and soil make it an ideal place to grow oil palm to produce palm oil, a product used worldwide to make chocolate. biscuits. toothpaste and detergents, to name just a few.

The palm oil industry is huge worldwide, with around half of all supermarket products containing some sort of palm oil.




Large multinational companies have taken advantage of this demand, seeking suitable land for their enormous oil palm plantation with little regard for the people who live on that land.



Many families are left with nothing and have to start over and rebuild their lives.

This year's Appeal will work with Christian Aid to seek justice for those who have had their land taken.

The Appeal will also support Tear Fund projects, working through the local church to equip communities to reduce the impact of climate related disasters.



Regular flooding not only brings crop loss, disease, displacement and death, it sets communities back and pushes them further into poverty.

Local churches are equipping communities to reduce the impact of disasters. For families, it means they aren't starting from scratch every time a disaster strikes.
