But as we reflect on the judgment of God, we can have hope!




Paul writes in Colossians 2v13-15:

They are not your ultimate Judge, God is! He loves you, forgives you and welcomes you in Christ's name. Such freedom!




I pray that this Easter time, you would join with us and discover that wonderful Gospel freedom in Christ for yourself.

In the recent past I have been participating on some Saturday mornings in a Parkrun.



Parkrun is the name given to a series of 5 kilometres timed events that take place each week in 17 countries across the world.

They are open to people of all ages and abilities, with the aim of encouraging people to exercise regularly in the open air in beautiful surroundings. These events, free of charge, are volunteer-led and participants can run, jog or walk.

I was encouraged initially to try a Parkrun as part of a health project. The first occasion, in Ormeau Park, was an eye-opener. So many participants!



My ability meant that I could only walk – not jog or run; unsurprisingly I came in last at no. 363! It was discouraging!

In fact, coming in last (or almost last) in following events became the norm, as most or all of the other folk were running or jogging. On a few occasions, even the finish tape had been removed prior to my arrival!

The one redeeming factor that initially kept me continuing to participate was the knowledge that at each event, although I was placed last, I was always first in my age group (no other females in that age bracket!).

The fact that I could be first and last in the same event continues to make me smile and gives me a proper perspective!

On each occasion that I go now, either to Ormeau Park or Victoria Park, the Biblical verse Matthew 20 v 16 freshly comes to mind - 'So the last will be first, and the first will be last.'

The intent of Parkrun is not to establish winners and losers in a race. The events are to encourage everyone of whatever ability to participate, regardless of time taken, health. benefit in pleasant forming environments, new and experiencing friendships the sense of belonging to community.

Likewise, in the Biblical story, Jesus teaches that His values are not those of the world. A Christian's inner motivation - contentment in life, concern for others before self and living in the will of God - are the criteria to be aimed for.

Position in society, economic standard, power, prestige, race, colour and creed are not the measures that count in the Lord's eyes. He looks for love, justice, mercy, humility and generosity.



Jesus lived on earth according to the values He desires of each of us. He died, showing at the end of His 33 years the real meaning of love, forgiveness and obedience to God.

Easter is an opportunity to review our priorities in life. The world's standards and objectives influence and drive us continually so that the natural person tends to be self-centred, proud, assertive,



competitive and acquisitive, wanting more and often discontented.

However, life is a gift from God, to be lived in His way, in His service, for Him. Our life has been bought and redeemed with the precious blood of Jesus on the cross.

The criteria for living has been set by God, through Jesus: 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow Me'.

This requires commitment, discipline and at times, involves pain. True fulfilment, meaning in life and the joy of the Lord comes from making that choice.



Having now completed 11 Parkruns, it no longer matters in what position I finish. The fulfilment is in the participation and being part of the community of Park runners, joggers and walkers.

As part of the community of God's people, likewise the only accolade of lasting worth at the end of life's journey is to receive our Lord's 'well done'.

This Easter, as followers of Jesus, may we celebrate with thanksgiving, humility and joy.

OBITUARY

Wilfred Patterson

The following tribute was read by Mr J C Shivers, Clerk of Session, at the meeting of the Kirk Session on 23 January 2018

It is with great sadness that I advise the Kirk Session of the death of one of our Elders, Wilfred (Wilfie) Patterson who passed away peacefully on 17 December after a pro-longed illness. He was 87 years old.

Wilfie was not always associated with the congregation having been brought up in St John's Presbyterian, Newtownbreda. As a child both he and his now deceased sister Audrey attended Rosetta Primary School.

From there Wilfie moved to the old Belfast Institute and commenced training in engineering. Wilfie's working life was spent entirely in the Sirocco Engineering Works, from the age of 14 years to when he retired early at the age of 63 years, some 49 years with the same company.

As a young man Wilfie played rugby for Cooke RFC and after retirement from the game would have followed their fortunes from the touchline. During the summer months he would also have played cricket for the club. In later life Wilfie found enjoyment in bowling, playing for the McQuiston Outdoor Bowling Club.

Wilfie met a young Muriel Majors at the Sirocco Works Tennis Club and they were married in St John's Newtownbreda on 4 June 1958 by the Rev. Rex Pedlow who was, at that time, an Assistant Minister in McQuiston.

Their first home was in Orangefield Avenue before moving to Beechgrove Avenue in 1965. Their marriage was enriched with two children Neale and Ashleigh.

Wilfie and Muriel were always faithful in their attendance at the worship services and it was not until the last year or so, due to medical conditions, that they found it difficult to sit in the pews. However, they were always keen to be kept informed of what was happening in the life of the church.

Within the congregation Wilfie was the Convenor of the Vestibule Committee arranging members to welcome and greet folk as they gathered for worship on a Sunday. He was also a very active member of the peace and peace-making team.

Even in latter years Wilfie would faithfully take his turn to serve on the door rota offering security and support to the Guide Sections on a Monday evening.

Wilfie was ordained to the Eldership on 25 September 1983. He fulfilled his duties as an Elder with enthusiasm and faithfulness. As an Elder he visited the families in his District, initially in the Bloomfield area, and following a re-organisation of Districts, the families at the top of the Cregagh Road. He was always most welcome in their homes.

We convey our sympathy to Muriel, Neale and Ashleigh, son-in-law Moore, grand-daughter Rebecca and baby great-grand-daughter Sophie, thanking God for the life of Wilfie who knew the joy of the Saviour's love and who served his Lord with faithfulness.

As is our custom I would ask you to rise for a moment's silent tribute to a beloved Elder who has completed his course and has entered into the joy of the Lord.


