Thank you so much for all your support this year and we look forward to seeing you all at the start of the next B.B. term in September. We pray that God will grant you both strength and comfort in these strange times.



CORONAVIRUS

Since the outbreak of this virus we, as Christians, are at times confused, fearful and seeking to understand where God's hand and purpose is in it.

Many of us will probably have had some, if not all, of the following questions going around in our heads.

However, we must remember that God is sovereign and His priorities for us are often different to our own. 'My thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways.' (Isaiah 55: 8]

Society: 'What about my plans?!'

God: 'My plans for you are always better than your own. Don't worry. I am going to work this all out for your good.'

Society: 'We're not going to get anything done!'

Play games. Bake cakes. Work on projects you have never had the time for. Teach them kindness and grace. Show them how to endure difficult circumstances and steer them towards me.'

God: 'Prevention, yes. Precaution, yes. Preparedness, yes. But after that, it is time to put the needs of others before your own.

MAGAZINE CELEBRATES 60 VOLUMES

We are absolutely delighted to bring you our 60th Volume of the church magazine.

Having started in 1908 we have faithfully brought you the news, events, children's stories, obituaries and miscellaneous items.

At Easter 2010 we introduced our new title Pulse which has attracted various comments, most of which are complementary. However, as you are aware we have been hit by the Coronavirus and as such this edition is remarkably small. Nevertheless, here is a brief history of our church magazine.

If you are an historian you will note that an initial magazine for McQuiston was published in 1908 which ran each month until 1921.

Most copies are available for inspection in the Presbyterian Historical Society, Assembly Buildings, Belfast.

They were available for collection costing just one old penny. Along with interesting items concerning the church the copies also contained 24 pages with general interests.

The motto for 1908 was "Remember the Sabbath Day to keep it holy".

That magazine contained a large number of advertisements which obviously kept the cost down. The magazine served congregation of the over 500 families and information 1 contained 22 church on organisations.



Why the magazine stopped in 1921 and was not re-introduced until 1960 we are unable to discover, but it has remained in publication since and free to recipients.



Over these years our ministers or ministers assistant have contributed to each edition, often bringing challenge or encouragement to the congregation.

They have reflected society through difficult times - 1970/80s, celebrating the millennium in 2000, the erection of the new halls and the succession of new ministers.

Should you wish to look something up since 1960 all editions are neatly filed away in the Church office.

However we are missing magazines from the years 1974 - 79, so if you happen to have some of those please contact me and I can make copies to add to the collection.

From the 1960s the magazine has had a number of Editors - Ossie Smyth, Bell. Derek Howard Thompson and John Shivers.

Those men have been ably assisted by a dedicated band of helpers including Tim Graham, Philip Kemps and Craig Wootton for the last 10 vears.



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
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
