May the Lord bless His church and may that blessing also rest on you and your loved ones this Easter.


Provision of online service

Joining us online each Sunday is easy to do so via our YouTube Channel or Facebook page, illustrated below.


YouTube

Jesus said "My house will be called a house of prayer" Matthew 21:13



Prayer, central in the ministry of Jesus while on earth, sets us the example we should follow in our Christian living.

We read in each of the Gospels of Jesus often going off alone to pray to God — sometimes in early morning; sometimes spending the whole night in prayer.

Jesus needed this regular contact with his Father, quality time to be renewed physically and spiritually, and to find the guidance that was required to do His will.

Likewise, for each of us to grow in our faith, and to walk according to the Lord's will in our lives, we need this vital link with our Heavenly Father on an ongoing basis.



At other times Jesus took His disciples away from the crowds to teach them, and so that they could pray together. This highlights the importance for us to meet and spend time together with others in prayer with our Saviour and Lord.

As we read in Acts, from the early days of the Church this pattern of Jesus was followed – both in private prayer at home, and very much as the church met together (at times, when threatened, behind locked doors) to pray as a body of believers. This has continued through the centuries.

Prior to COVID-19, McQuiston's prayer ministry included praying before and during Church services; the



mid-week prayer meeting; and within the various meetings and organisations held throughout the week. There was also a 'prayer tree' for members to attach prayer requests.

Since the lockdowns of the last year ministry, although our praver limited, has faithfully continued during Church services via the live stream and Zoom for the Wednesday praver and group, other meetings.

In addition, a WhatsApp Prayer Group has been in existence for 20 months, where individuals at home pray regularly for requests, needs and events at home and worldwide. Easter reminds us of the great sacrifice
Jesus made for each of Prayer us in His death and Requests resurrection.

Especially this Easter - in a world that has been affected, at every level of society, by COVID-19 - we appreciate more than ever the gift of prayer. Talking with our Heavenly stopped. Father has not been whether privately or collectively, a stability and gives us and assurance in our daily living.

Robert encourages all of us each week during the Sunday service to join the Wednesday night Zoom prayer meeting. If you have not ventured to join this group, please give serious thought to doing so.





OBITUARY

Rev. William John Roy Robinson B.Sc., B.D.

The following tribute was read by Mr J C Shivers, Clerk of Session, at the meeting of the Kirk Session on 26 January 2021

It is with great sadness that I advise the Kirk Session of the death of our Senior Minister Emeritus, the Rev. Roy Robinson who passed away on Wednesday, 16 December. He was 82 years of age.

Roy was born on 16 February 1938 and lived in Dunmurry Village. He attended Dunmurry Primary before transferring to the Royal Belfast Academical Institution. On leaving school he worked as a textile chemist and studied on a part-time basis for a B.Sc. in science.

Both of Roy's parents died when he was just 16 while he was still at school. He has three sisters – Gloria, Beatrice and Joyce. At the age of 14 Roy came to faith at Dunmurry Presbyterian Church.

He met Lois, who had moved from England to live in Northern Ireland, at a Christian Endeavour weekend at Castlerock organised by Dunmurry Presbyterian Church.

It was during this time that he applied to enter the ministry but plans were put on hold when they heard a representative from the Qua Iboe Mission in Nigeria seeking someone to go and teach science at a new secondary school in Ochaja. A wedding was hastily planned for January 1962 in Whiteabbey Presbyterian Church which was followed by a three week sailing with all their earthly belongings to Nigeria.

After three years at the mission they moved to Kaduna, initially to the Government Secondary School, before joining the staff of the Kaduna

Polytechnic where Roy became Director of the school of Science and Technology. Some ten years later they returned home and Roy entered the Presbytery College completing his B.D. and was ordained at Dundonald Presbyterian Church in 1975.

His first charge was in 1976 to Conlig Presbyterian Church and during the succeeding years oversaw the development of congregations at Kilcooley and Lisnabreen. In addition he was involved with the Chaplaincy work at Newtownards Hospital.

In August 1987 Roy accepted a call from McQuiston Memorial and became our 7th Minister. During his ministry there were many notable highlights including our centenary celebrations, a flower festival, a Millennium concert, our first female Assistant Minister, the formation of our Praise Group and our BB Company Centenary. He enjoyed the pleasure of those families who had given birth to children and brought comfort to the bereaved. Our Youth Organisations flourished during his Ministry and Roy and Lois would have been faithful participants at their Annual Displays. He oversaw the preparation and ordination of seven former Assistants and took pleasure in their on-going service.

In October 2000 Roy retired to live in Newcastle to be closer to their son Clive and two grandchildren. Their daughter Alison, who lives in London, also has 2 children. In later years Roy and Lois moved to live in Bangor. In his retirement Roy loved to potter in the garden but always found time to visit us at McQuiston at least a couple of time each year and loved to be kept updated on events around the congregation.

We convey our sympathy to Lois, children Clive and Alison and their families, thanking God for the life of Roy who knew the joy of the Saviour's love and who served his Lord with faithfulness.

As is our custom I would ask you to rise for a moment's silent tribute to a former Minister and teaching Elder who has completed his course and has entered into the joy of the Lord.

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
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
